I fell over a few weeks ago. Really hurt. I always seem to be in a rush, and running across Frant Green I fell over and smacked into the side of the

Funny thing was though, my immediate concern was not for my arm that was totally numb, nor for my ribs (which ended up being cracked), no, my immediate concern was to check whether anyone saw me making a fool of myself! I had visions of a video of a vicar dramatically falling spreading all over the internet.

Why is it that we think like that? Why are we so concerned, or even obsessed about how other perceive us, to the extent that even when we need help we don't always ask for it for fear of how it might look?

Fact is everyone does it, everyone falls over, everyone needs help. Someone said to me, "It isn't just the older people who fall!" I hope I can make others feel better when it happens to them.

Like a typical bloke, I decided I didn't need to get checked out at the hospital, the ribs were the worst and there wasn't much they could do. It was so painful though ten days later I eventually got checked out.

The nice nurse looked at the massive bruise on my arm, and me holding my ribs... "I am assuming drink was involved?" she said in a jolly way that showed that for her this was a common occurrence. "No actually" I said, trying to not show embarrassment, "I'm a vicar and I happened to be running late for a prayer meeting." I bet she hadn't heard that one before. The dangers of rural clergy life.

Why is it that we are so hesitant to ask for help? We are all born as a baby into total need and dependency on others, and at the end of life we rely on care from others. Yet in the middle of our life between those extremes of utter dependence at the beginning and the end, we like to think and act as though we are ourselves fully independent, self-made, self-reliant people. This was shown to me by my first inclination to check I wasn't seen falling over.

The fact is every one of us is just all one slip away from dependency on another person's care. As a Father to our son Malachi who has complex disabilities, and who is fully dependant on others for everything, I also realise that our worth and value doesn't come from our ability or strength, for he is immensely loved. As a Christian I realise that I am dependant on God for everything, for life, breath and salvation. Perhaps the lesson is ultimately one of humility to others and to God, we all need help.

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News From The Pews

Spring in the churchyard is always something to look forward to and never fails to delight us. Our thanks to the loyal volunteers who keep it looking good for us all to enjoy.

On 1st January we changed the times of our Sunday services, Frant now has its service at 10.30, and Eridge at 9.15. As with any change, it suits the majority of people, but raises difficulties for others, particularly the children and young people who have sports commitments on Sunday morning. Festival Church, which is held on Sunday afternoons in the Rectory Paddock restarts later in the spring, so will provide an alternative for those who can't make 10.30.

Although numbers attending services are climbing back to pre-lockdown numbers, sadly finances are not recovering, and our reserves are reducing at an alarming rate each month. We rely mainly on the regular giving from our congregations to support our Rector and pay our running expenses. Money raised from fund raising events pays for fabric maintenance. We are doing all we can to reduce our running costs, taking steps where possible to be more efficient, but like all small Parishes, lack of funds remains a major concern.

Like any family, our congregation consists of members of all ages from $\mathbf{0}$ to nearly 100 years old. In January we were saddened by the death of one of our senior members, John Gibbons who was 93. John, with his wife, Esther moved to Tunbridge Wells from Leicester 8 years ago to be near their family. Sadly we never got to know John as well as we'd have liked to, as he was already suffering from the early stages of alzheimer's disease when they moved here, but amazingly, until quite recently he could still read fluently from the bible and take part in discussions at the home group of which he and Esther were members. In speaking about his father, Matthew his elder son said that John's great passions in life were mountains, being out of doors and music. He was indeed an accomplished and enthusiastic mountaineer, who with Esther, had climbed many famous peaks in several countries. At his funeral service we watched film of breathtaking mountain scenery accompanied by lovely music which reflected his life perfectly and was a very fitting tribute. One other great accomplishment was that John and



Esther would have been celebrating their 70th! wedding anniversary later this year.

Youth Activities certainly haven't been taking a winter break as our Youth Minister Ed reports:-'A few weeks ago, I was honoured to be the guest speaker at Lindfield Church's youth weekend away. 17 young people, plus leaders embarked on a trip to the middle of Ashdown Forest where the young people were given a full program of teaching, small group discussions, activities and social time. I gave four sessions on the theme 'Encountering Jesus'. It was great to be able to support another church, and for me it was good to experience how another church runs things. Our youth enjoyed meeting with other young people from Tunbridge Wells in February for another 'Youth for Christ' event. This time it was on the theme of 'Gaming and Pizza!'There were computer games, group games, board games, and of course PIZZA! A speaker from 'Youth for Christ' gave a message from the Bible to the young people.

Lego Club is still going strong (above). We have increased in numbers to our maximum of 12 children, and we even have a waiting list! This term we've been looking at Jesus' life and how he can affect ours... All through Lego!

Sunday Club has increased in number, back up to numbers we experienced before the pandemic. We had 18 children the other week, with 2 groups running at the same time. We've continued to teach

the children the same theme and passage as the adults to enable families to chat about the topic at home after the service.

Our parent and baby/toddler group, 'Little Fishes' is going from strength to strength, with the numbers having grown recently. We have bible stories, singing, playing, crafts, coffee and more. The welcoming and friendly atmosphere is very evident.' Thank you Ed and Julie for your hard work and dedication to our youth ministry. At the end of January we did some alterations to the Stables to allow Ed and Julie's family more space, privacy and security in their first floor flat. In order to add a locking door on the ground floor, the staircase had to be repositioned to comply with building regulations. Our thanks to architect Peter Payne and builder Alan Campey who have done an excellent job so that the new door and wall look as though they were always there.

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Frant Village Shop

We thought we would give you an update on how your village shop is getting on during these challenging economic times.

Like so many other small independent businesses we have made some changes to address the cost of living issues, such as switching off some fridges and lighting as commercial energy prices have quadrupled and we have decided to no longer accept AMEX cards due to high transaction fees.

We continue to try to provide a variety of products for you to purchase locally. However, because of changes to our wholesale supplier it is not always possible to stock certain cheaper items as we have been able to do in the past without advertising one of the largest supermarkets in the country!!! We believe it is very important to maintain our independence to continue to provide our customers with locally sourced products and from customer feedback this is an important aspect of the shop but in order for the village shop to stay open, it requires the village to support it.

Can we remind customers that Royal Mail are a completely separate company to the Post Office, When Royal Mail were striking before Christmas, we continued to be open and taking vast amounts of post which was not collected. Whilst the majority of customers understood, there were a certain amount that took offence that parcels had not been delivered or collected which is completely out of our control. It is the same with International Post, The Post Office are currently not allowed to send parcels abroad but you can send them via Royal Mail website!

Thank you all for your continued custom and we look forward to seeing you in the shop and in Daisy's Cafe next door. May we just finish on a small anecdote (just to help the independents!)

One for us to think about.

Why are banks so keen on promoting a cashless society

I have a £50 banknote in my pocket. I go to a restaurant and pay for dinner with it. The restaurant owner then uses the note to pay for his laundry. The laundry owner then uses the note to pay the barber. The barber uses the note for shopping etc. After an unlimited number of payments, the note will still retain its value of £50 and greedy banks have earned precisely nothing from any transaction.



But if I come to a restaurant and pay digitally - Card and bank fees for my transaction are charged to the seller at about 3%, so around £1.50 and the fees will continue for each further transaction in my previous list

Therefore, after 30 transactions of the initial £50 only £5 will technically still be in circulation with the remaining £45 now the property of the bank

Where is Eridge?

Where is Eridge? Someone asked this recently, and it's a good question. If you are driving down the A26 towards Lewes you may see a pub and a church on your right. Further on you may see a village sign, apparently in the middle of nowhere, but you probably haven't seen a handful of houses hidden behind hedges (especially if you are speeding, as most people do). You don't understand why the speed limit should be 40 mph, but those of us who live there do, and you would never guess that the home of one of England's oldest noble families is nearby.

Eridge Green is technically a hamlet, but there is no real centre to it. There isn't even a green anymore, since it was taken into Eridge Park two hundred years ago. The pub was probably a farm then, and the church wasn't built until the 1850s, by the Earl of Abergavenny. It was for the use of his family, his servants and tenants and this is perhaps the answer to

where Eridge is.

The name Eridge means 'eagle's ridge' in Anglo-Saxon, but where is the ridge? There is nowhere very obvious that might attract eagles. Eridge Rocks are fine, but hardly mountainous. As you approach Eridge from the south the houses along the Forstal stand out, at the end of the outcrop of rock. There is something of a ridge where Eridge Park house is built, but the whole area is full of small hills and valleys. However, the Anglo-Saxons, who gave us most of our place-names, where very conscious of the landscape and there must have been something here which attracted eagles.

The parish is the smallest unit of local government, and it has defined borders. A hamlet does not have borders; it's an area which the locals know and define themselves. Villages tend to be nucleated - that is, the houses are grouped together with a church and manor house (though there are exceptions). Hamlets might be, but in the case of Eridge the houses are isolated and scattered over a wide area. This may be because it was part of a medieval deer park. It is likely that the house in the park was first called Eridge and gave its name to the area.

Eridge was part of the manor and parish of Rotherfield. Later it became part of Frant parish, then it became its own parish when it had its own church until returning to Frant as it is today. The church is unusual in serving a congregation so hidden away, but there is a loyal group who keep it going as a centre for a settlement that has no centre. -MaryAlexander

During the afternoon people socialised over a cup of tea and cake. Thank you to Sally and her helpers for organising the teas and everyone who provided a cake. A total of £310 was raised and added to the defibrillator fund. Thank you to everyone who came along to support this good cause.

News from Nus Ghani, MP

Wealden always looks stunning with a bit of snow in the morning, but unfortunately, the end of last year exposed vulnerabilities in our infrastructure. When the icy spell hit in December, leaky or burst pipes meant that South East Water (SEW) reservoirs in the Tunbridge Wells area were drained of their necessary capacity and unfortunately, this resulted in many homes in Eridge, Crowborough, Mayfield, and Wadhurst areas losing water for several days.

Running up to Christmas, I had many angry exchanges with SEW staff including the Chief Executive every day of the outage, and I could not get any sensible response, especially with regards to when water would be returned and what additional support was being provided to vulnerable residents, who were my priority. SEW

inflicted unnecessary distress on so many local residents at a time when many families were preparing for Christmas, and I recognise the strength of feeling on the failure of their service locally.

I have been campaigning for full financial compensation and for many it has been forthcoming, but I was most concerned by reports that some residents have either not received compensation or have been told that they were not eligible for it. To assess the scale of this problem, I launched a dedicated platform on my website to gather evidence, and I was shocked to receive several hundred submissions. Please know that I have secured a further meeting with SEW, where I will use this data to push for compensation for all affected customers without delay.

Further south in Wealden, residents of Hailsham and Hellingly faced the opposite problem in January, when heavy rainfall resulted in severe flooding and sewage discharges into people's gardens. Getting a response from Southern Water and the Environment Agency has been appalling. I was regularly updated by the Parish Council that they too were unable to obtain a response, so I convened a meeting with representatives of the Parish Council, Wealden District Council, East Sussex County Council, East Sussex Highways and Southern Water directly on site in Hellingly to hold the water company and the Environment Agency to account.

I share everyone's frustration at the lack of planning and the speed of response when such disruptive events take place in Wealden. It is clear that SEW and Southern Water just aren't investing enough in their infrastructure and have a resilience problem. While severe weather conditions may be an explanation for the disruptions, they are not an acceptable excuse, and I am again incredibly disappointed that lessons do not appear to have been learnt.

I appreciate the misery that both the water outage and the flooding have caused to many households in the constituency. Please be assured that I am pursuing both matters further and will continue to push for more funding for critical infrastructure, better performance and response rate from these companies, and for regular updates on resilience and future planning with local communities.




Parish Past

Sidney Lewis was only 12 years old when he ran away from home and enlisted to fight in The First World War - the youngest confirmed combatant on any side so far as is known. Apparently sufficiently robustly built to pass the medical, astonishingly no one questioned his age. He then underwent ten months training before being sent to the killing fields of the Somme in 1916. There he served as a machine-gunner for some weeks before his mother was finally able to trace him and notified the War Office of his true age, producing a birth certificate to prove it.

After an inevitable delay he was finally discharged in 1917, only to re-enlist in 1918 (still underage) and serve in the occupation force in Austria after the war's end. He later became a police officer and volunteered to train in bomb disposal in WWII.

Sydney was born in Surrey but in the mid 1950's became landlord of The George in Frant, finally retiring to Hailsham in 1963/4, where he died in 1967. What an extraordinary man! -Pat Wright

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


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


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
